SYLLABUS STATEMENT

An introduction to theories and skills for working with groups within a context of practice and assessment frameworks.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Through lecture and experiential learning, this course is designed to offer the student:

- An awareness of alternative approaches and strategies for planned change at the group level.
- An opportunity to learn and practice specific skills appropriate for social work intervention with groups.
- A beginning critical awareness of one's own personal style as a group leader and member.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students will be able to:

- 1. Gain knowledge of the various types of groups, and group facilitation in social work
- 2. Build an understanding of group theory, stages of development and facilitation of change in groups
- 3. Identify and assess group functioning and dynamics and social work or facilitator role within this context
- 4. Develop a thorough and comprehensive group proposal to understand the value and necessity of this skill
- 5. Enhance basic skills in group facilitation, and enhance social work identify and use of self
