#### **SYLLABUS STATEMENT**

Advanced integration of concepts, perspectives, theories and skills with practicum experiences, developing conceptual frameworks of practice.

### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course is designed to facilitate the integration and transfer of knowledge, values, and skills derived from other BSW courses, past work, lived experiences, and within field placements. Students will be expected to demonstrate competence in their ability to identify, apply, critique and evaluate theories and conceptual frameworks while in a practice setting.

Students and instructors are expected to co-create an inclusive and positive learning community by developing numerous opportunities for participation and contribution of unique insights and perspectives. Diversity is valued and respected and each session will include a range of activities designed to foster student's comfort in sharing their ways of knowing, skills, and experiences. These may include group discussions, interactive activities, and engaging a diverse range of guest speakers to present multiple perspectives.

The intent of the assignments is to provide opportunities to foster professional development and make connections between thinking, feeling, and doing in relation to being a social worker.

This course will take place **online via Zoom and Desire2Learn (D2L)**. To best succeed in the course, students are expected to participate in the synchronous Zoom sessions and asynchronous learning tasks using the D2L learning environment.

Two hours per week will be spent in an online seminar. An additional one hour per week will consist of asynchronous activities which may include readings, applications of theory or questions designed to assist students to further integrate theory and practice.

**Pre-requisite(s):** completion of all required 400 level Social Work courses.

Co-requisite(s): SOWK 412: Practicum II.

## **COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES**

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Identify, apply and reflect on their developing social work knowledge, values, and skills in the areas of generalist practice, reflective practice, competence with diversity, social policy and social justice, and professional identity/ethics;
- 2. Critically assess social work practice experiences through reflection, peer review, constructive feedback and consultation;
- 3. Have an enhanced ability to identify the linkages between the personal experiences of individuals and issues of social structures, and to act appropriately in relation to these insights;
- 4. Examine, critically reflect on and discuss the applications of theory in practice and the suitability of various practice methods;
- 5. Demonstrate entry-level social work intervention/response skills in specific area(s) of focus;
- 6. Consider and apply the CASW Code of Ethics in their social work practice and discussions; and
- 7. Actively participate in class discussions and work collaboratively and collectively with other students in furthering learning and professional development.

## 1. Integrating Theory and Practice (ITP) Loops

ITP Loop 1 Due Date: October 17, 2022 by 11:59 pm

ITP Loop 2 Due Date: November 21, 2022 by 11:59 pm

Value: 40% (2 x 20%)

Submission: D2L Discussion Board

Format: Essay format; APA 7th edition

**Length**: 750 to 1250 words

Aligned Course Learning Outcomes: 1 -7

**Grading:** A grading rubric will be provided

**Assignment Details**: You will submit two separate ITP loops.

The intent of these assignments is to engage in reflective, collaborative social work practice using a combination of the ITP Loop and Peer Consultation. One of the two ITP Loops must be framed around the issues of promoting and actualizing equity, racial justice, diversity, inclusion, and decolonization. The ITP Loop is a model that allows social workers to deconstruct their practice and break it down into its component parts. At first glance, social work practice appears holistic and intuitive, but it can be unraveled and articulated with much greater detail. Practice itself is a combination of listening, feeling, thinking, and acting in which all these processes occur simultaneously. The ITP loop allows us to take a closer look at these processes with the goal of integrating social work theory and the field education experience. The ITP Loop consists of the following phases: retrieval (remembering a practicum situation), reflection, linkage, and professional response.

<u>Step 1</u>: ITP Loop Process and Write-up Students will apply the ITP loop (see steps below) to a practicum experience and share the issue with students in a seminar. Following feedback and input from students submit a final written version in Discussion Board. We recommend you complete the first four steps of the ITP loop and formulate potential questions prior to presenting in class. You will have fifteen minutes of class for any final edits prior to peer consultation. The submission should include of the following sections (and be about 1 page single spaced):

- Retrieval Recall salient facts of a recent practice experience. In a paragraph or two, briefly describe a significant experience that has taken place in your practicum setting. In telling the story, position yourself as the author using the first person. Things to share may include: interactions with significant others, links between present and past experiences, feelings, ideas or meaning making that occurred. As relevant, include the intellectual, spiritual, social, physical, and aesthetic dimensions in the telling of the story.
- 2. Reflections Recall your thoughts and feelings about the situation. Focus on the subjective beliefs and attitudes, personal experiences, and cultural world views that are relevant to the situation. Identify how these factors influenced your interaction.
- 3. Linkage Identify the key actions you took and explain how you chose those actions. Which practice models, practice wisdom, learned techniques or skills did you consider/use? This is the area where you will bring theory to the issue.
- 4. Professional Response consider whether your response was selected through deliberate or intuitive use of reflection and linkage. Do you feel that your response was effective, appropriate, or sufficient? What could you have done differently? How may that have impacted your work? What did you learn about social work practice?
- 5. Questions to Peers What 1-3 questions do you have for your peers about this practice experience? What did you learn about your practice from the peer consultation and your research?

<u>Step 2</u>: Providing Feedback to Others. In class, students will be asked to share their ITP loops in a small group. Students are expected to offer helpful, supportive, and resourceful consultation and feedback to

their peers. Students who are unable to participate in the peer consultation portion in class can achieve a maximum of 80% for their ITP Loop write up.

<u>Step 3</u>: Subsequent to the in class consultations students will submit a completed ITP loop, including a summary of their peers' feedback, via Discussion Board as per due dates.

## 2. Personal Practice Identity

Due Date: December 5, 2022

**Value**: 40%

Submission: D2L Dropbox

**Format**: You will create a presentation using PowerPoint, Prezi, Canva, Piktochart, or another platform. Alternative platforms and/or formats for the presentation may be discussed with the instructor.

**Length**: 15 to 20 minutes

Aligned Course Learning Outcomes: 1 -7

**Grading:** A grading rubric will be provided.

**References**: You must incorporate at least 5 articles or books relevant to your practice. You must adhere to APA 7th edition formatting guidelines.

**Description**: Students are expected to locate themselves in social work practice either through creative expression (Infographic or visual representation) <u>or</u> via a short paper which is 6 pages in length <u>or</u> a recorded oral presentation. It is important to remember that what is unique about a social work practice framework is that it includes a micro level systems analysis as well as attention to the dynamic and changing social environment and how you influence your practice with your personal context and application of experience and values. Your assignment will highlight what has contributed to your professional identity up to this point and identify directions for future growth and learning. There are three potential formats which you can use to develop the assignment:

- 1. Paper: In a word document, integrate the components outlined above in 6 double spaced pages. Submit this via Dropbox or as an attachment in D2L. Summarize your paper using a word cloud and post to the D2L discussion board. http://wordclouds.com
- Visual representation: Utilizing your own creativity or a technology-based design program, symbolize the above noted points in a webpage, infographic or consult with your instructor for other visual representations. Post the upload your digital link to the Dropbox. - 3. **Recorded oral presentation:** In a recorded format such as audio or video, integrate the components outlined about in a 10-15 minute oral presentation. Submit this via Dropbox in a .mp3 or .mp4 format. Summarize your presentation using a wordcloud or 2-3 minute audio/video summary and post to the D2L discussion board. http://wordclouds.com

This assignment will give you the opportunity to define and discuss your model, theory and/or framework for social work practice, exemplified by your time in the BSW program including field placements and classroom work. Scholarly and practicum experiences come together to influence this perspective. The presentation will illuminate your critical thinking and integration of former and new knowledge.

Whatever format is chosen the following sections are to be included:

- Professional/personal orientation: Sources informing your practice (theories, frameworks, approaches, literature, experience). This description of your developing professional and personal lenses should include a discussion of your theoretical practice framework, personal and professional values, social location
- **Links**: between theory and practice should be clearly articulated.
- **Social location** (such as gender, race, age, class, sexual orientation), experiences, and identity in practice
- **Skills:** identify the personal strengths/capacities (existing and emerging) you used as well as any limitations, emerging strengths for practice and the gifts you offer to the profession
- **Directions for future learning or practice** (e.g., skills, topics, approaches, opportunities, further education or professional training)
- Strategies for continually improving and reflecting on your practice.
- Students will reflect on and respond to the question: How did the classroom and practice learning from your BSW program influence the emerging social worker you are now?
- Final reflection/readiness for practice: putting it all together what does this all mean for you as a beginning BSW practitioner? Include areas for continued exploration, growth, and professional development.

## 3. Participation - Self-assessment

**Due Date**: December 5, 2022 by 11:59pm

Value: 20%

Submission: D2L Dropbox

Length: 500 words

Format: Essay format; APA 7th edition

**Aligned Course Learning Outcomes**: 1,6,7

Assignment Details: The seminar is experiential in nature and student participation is considered essential to individual and class learning. You are expected to attend all seminars and to be involved in the class discussions by sharing experiences and ideas from the field. You are also expected to support the learning of your peers by encouraging their participation, hearing their perspectives, and sharing constructive feedback. Time will be provided in each class for small group work and constructive peer feedback.

You will submit your self-assessment for one-half of the participation grade (10%), while the instructor's evaluation will comprise the other half (10%) of your grade. The self-assessment should comment on your level of participation, contributions to the collective learning, final reflections on major learning from the practicum/seminar, a recommended grade out of 10, and a rationale for the recommended grade.

Criteria for class participation include:

- level of sharing of experiences
- introducing new ideas and learning new information
- engaging in class discussions
- demonstrating active listening
- openness to the ideas of others
- ability to pose questions
- adherence to group ground rules established by the class
