SYLLABUS STATEMENT

This course provides an overview of the social work profession and the social policy context within which it is practiced.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course explores social welfare and introduces social work in Canada. Through inquiry-based learning, readings, learning from guest speakers and discussion, students will explore historical background, philosophical underpinnings, ethical guidelines, professional standards, theoretical frameworks, and diverse areas of social work practice.

This course will take place online via Desire2Learn (D2L) and Zoom. To best succeed in the course, students are expected to participate in the asynchronous learning tasks using the D2L learning environment and synchronous Zoom sessions. When unable to participate live due to the time difference or unforeseen circumstances, inform the instructor in advance and propose and implement propose an alternative participation activity (e.g., watch the recordings, submit a brief reflection, and actively contribute to the follow-up online discussion).

Four synchronous Zoom sessions, with recordings available, will be scheduled throughout the term.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon completion of this course, you will be able to:

- 1) Understand the broader context and critically reflect on the history and perspectives of Canadian social welfare and social work.
- 2) Examine the well-being and justice experienced by diverse community members in their interactions with people, social structures, social policies, and legislation.
- 3) Identify and integrate components of the social work profession, including values, theories, approaches, levels of practice, and the social work process.
- 4) Demonstrate an ability to self-reflect on their social locations and understand their impact on interpersonal relationships and professional social work practices.
- 5) Demonstrate social work knowledge and skills to apply them across various practice fields, working with individuals, families, groups, and communities of diverse backgrounds.
- 6) Explore the role of social work in perpetuating colonialism and contemporary efforts to decolonize social work practice and honour Indigenous ways of knowing and being.
- 7) Identify, analyze, and apply foundational social work theories, standards, values, and ethics to various settings and levels of social work practice.

GUIDELINES FOR ZOOM SESSIONS IN ONLINE CLASSES

Students are expected to participate actively in all Zoom sessions. Please be prepared, as best as you are able, to join class in a quiet space that allows you to be fully present and engaged in Zoom sessions. When possible, it is desirable for students to have their cameras turned on. You are expected to behave in a professional manner during all Zoom sessions. Please do not share the Zoom links with anyone who is not registered in this course.

MEDIA RECORDING FOR ASSESSMENT OF STUDENT LEARNING

The instructor may use media recordings as part of the assessment of students. This may include but is not limited to classroom discussions, presentations, clinical practice, or skills testing that occur during the course. These recordings will be used for student assessment purposes only and will not be shared or used for any other purpose.

ZOOM RECORDINGS OF ONLINE CLASSES

The instructor may record online Zoom class sessions for the purposes of supporting student learning in this class – such as making the recording available for review of the session or for students who miss a session. Students will be advised before the instructor initiates a recording of a Zoom session. These recordings will be used to support student learning only and will not be shared or used for any other purpose.

ASSESSMENT COMPONENTS

There are three main assignments in the class. Please refer the following descriptions:

1) Assignment 1: Integrated Learning Modules (50% total or 12.5% per module)

Due dates: May 18, May 25, June 7, June 16 at 11:59 pm, MST.

Aligned Course Learning Outcomes: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7.

<u>Assignment Description:</u> Integrated module assignments are designed to support learners in demonstrating their understanding and application of course materials. Learners will review the D2L module materials and generate assignments that help them integrate and apply their knowledge. They will create **four module assignments** that address the areas of focus in the four modules:

- Module 1: Concept map of a social work theory or practice model related to a case study.
- Module 2: Field of practice selection and process reflection. The reflection modality will respond to courses reading materials and to the chosen case study.
- Module 3: A letter to the editor and a social media post, excerpted from the letter to the editor, to address a social work issue.
- Module 4: Personal social work ethics statement in a modality of students' decision.

All integrated module assignments will be posted in your learning circle on D2L. Complete module assignment and process details are provided on D2L.

<u>Assessment Criteria</u>: The following criteria will be used to assess each module assignment: Clarity, Organization, and Presentation (2%); Mastery of Content (5%); Peer Feedback (2%); Evidence of Critical Reflection (3.5%). A complete assessment rubric will be provided on D2L.

2) Assignment 2: An Exploration of Your Social Worker Profile (35%)

Due date: June 15, 2024, at 11:59 pm MST.

Group sharing will be organized on final zoom session by Wednesday, June 12, 2024, from 5:00 pm to 8:00 pm MST.

Aligned Course Learning Outcomes: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7.

<u>Assignment Description:</u> This assignment aims to assist students in exploring their personal profiles as social workers. Throughout their learning journey, students will regularly reflect on the relevance of course materials and learning activities to their personal and professional experiences, values, qualities, skills, and approaches. They can choose from various methods (such as reflective journaling, voice memos or podcasts, artistic expressions, artifacts, storyboards, and multimedia) to express their evolving social worker profiles. Additional instructions are available on D2L.

<u>Assessment Criteria</u>: This assignment consists of three components, namely (personal expressions of social worker profiles (25%), ongoing development of profile through regular discussion board updates (5%) and group sharing of social worker profiles (5%). For detailed assessment criteria, please see the rubric posted on D2L.

3) Assignment 3: Ongoing Active Engagement with Learning Activities (15%)

Due Date: June 17, 2024, at 11:59 pm MST.

<u>Assignment Description:</u>

Because this course is primarily asynchronous, students' success will depend on their active participation and engagement with the material on D2L and the readings. The instructor will assign an engagement grade based on attendance at Zoom sessions, contributions to live discussions, and engagement with recorded lectures, videos, readings, and other ungraded course activities. Students are required to submit a one-paragraph self-assessment (maximum 250 words) and a completed engagement template to evaluate their engagement in the course. This self-assessment will include a self-assigned grade for engagement. It must be submitted via D2L Dropbox and will be considered by the instructor when assigning the grade. Failure to submit it will result in a grade of zero for this assignment.

ADDITIONAL ASSESSMENT AND EVALUATION INFORMATION

ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION EXPECTATIONS

This course will be taken place online through D2L and Zoom. To succeed in the course, students are expected to participate in asynchronous learning tasks using the D2L learning environment, as well as synchronous Zoom sessions. If unable to participate live due to unforeseen circumstances, please inform the instructor in advance and propose an alternative participation activity (e.g., watching the recordings, submitting a brief reflection, and actively contributing to the follow-up online discussion).

While this course primarily relies on asynchronous material, it is strongly encouraged for students to regularly log into D2L to stay up to date. Discussion postings will remain on the site for the duration of the course, but students are expected to contribute to the discussion in a timely manner. Discussion posts should validate and expand upon our learning. All postings and responses are expected to demonstrate respect, dignity, and confidentiality for all participants.

Students are also expected to attend the Zoom sessions and are encouraged to actively engage with their peers during group discussions. However, we understand that participation may look different for each individual, and therefore, students will have an opportunity to discuss what their engagement meant for them in Assignment 3 (as outlined above).

GUIDELINES FOR SUBMITTING ASSIGNMENTS

Please submit all assignments electronically through Dropbox in D2L as instructed in the assignment description above. Written assignments should be submitted in Word or PDF format. Assignments should have a file name as follows: "Full name and assignment number" (e.g., Jane Smith Assignment 2). Assignments are due by 11:59 pm on their due date. Please note that it is the student's responsibility to keep a copy of each submitted assignment and to ensure that the correct version is submitted.

LATE ASSIGNMENTS

Students have a 24-hour submission granted extension after the deadline. Any assignments submitted after the due date without an agreed-upon extension from the instructors will be subject to a 5% grade reduction per day. Late submissions will not receive extensive feedback. Students requiring a longer extension, such as those registered with Student Accessibility Services, may be granted one and should contact the TA and instructor to discuss this option. However, it is noted that, in order to request a deferral for unexpected circumstances, you are required to complete at least 90% of total assignments for the course.

All assignments will be assessed partly on writing skills. Writing skills include not only surface correctness (grammar, punctuation, sentence structure, etc.) but also general clarity and organization. Sources used in research papers must be properly documented and referenced in APA 7th edition format. Students are not encouraged to overly depend on artificial intelligence (AI) assistants (e.g. ChatGPT, Claude, Quillbot, or other AI chatbots). These AI assistants should be used with caution and responsibility as supplementary editorial supports to ensure clarity and grammatical correctness in students' essays. Please note that these chatbots cannot write your essay for you, as they are often associated with fabrications and false information. Using them without caution may raise concerns of academic misconduct, as below.
